NHC is a church in the suburbs of Bangor, currently worshipping at Penobscot Christian School, where we've been for over a decade. We are nearing our 20th anniversary and consider ourselves a "newer" church, with a mix of original members and recent transplants.

We have a unique demographic, with an average of 50 congregants on Sundays, including nearly 30 children under 10, a majority of adults in their 30s, and a cohort of retirees. Theologically, NHC holds to the historic reformed creeds, with congregants coming from Reformed Baptist and Presbyterian traditions.

EARLY YEARS: 2005-2013

CHURCH PLANT WITH A GOAL TO BE REFORMED, CONTEMPORARY, AND EVANGELICAL

New Hope Church was launched in March 2005 as a church plant within the Christian Reformed Church (CRC) by a core group of committed believers led by Pastor Carl Bergman. Following several months of planning and once-a-month preview services, New Hope celebrated its "grand opening" in October 2005 with regular worship services in a rented space at the Bangor Motor Inn. At that time, 28 adults became members, and the congregation included 12 children. In the spring of 2006, the church moved to facilities at Penobscot Christian School in Bangor. The church established several programs and opportunities for spiritual and personal growth for members and the community including local and international outreach, Celebrate Recovery, Financial Peace University, Alpha, Men's Breakfast, Women's Study, other small groups, adult and children's Sunday School, and regular fellowship meals. In the fall of 2010, the church transitioned from a church plant to an organized church commissioned by the CRC. During this period and the next few years, New Hope experienced moderate growth in membership.







INTERMEDIATE YEARS: 2013-2020

A GROWING CHURCH WITH A FOCUS ON DISCIPLESHIP, EVANGELISM, AND WORSHIP

Jonathan Fischer, a Calvin Theological Seminary graduate, was hired as a pastoral intern in August 2013. In October of that year, Pastor Carl Bergman began a three-month sabbatical and Jonathan Fischer assumed interim pastoral duties. Upon his return, Pastor Bergman notified New Hope of his intent to retire from ministry in March 2014. The church approached Pastor Fischer about accepting a call as sole pastor of New Hope Church. Under his leadership, the church experienced a demographic shift. The arrival of a young pastor led to an increase in UMaine students and young families joining New Hope, which was accompanied by the joy of several new births within our church community. Sadly, at the same time, there were a few deaths, several members left due to job relocation, while others retired and moved from the area. The result was little change in overall church membership and attendance numbers.























SEASON OF TRANSITION: 2020-PRESENT

A CHURCH LOOKING FOR A NEW HOME AND SHEPHERD

During the past four years, New Hope has experienced several challenges. Like most churches, we struggled to navigate COVID and the challenges of gathered worship and ongoing fellowship. We pursued options for purchasing a permanent building and made offers on two. We were briefly under contract on one and investigated several others. Yet, these all fell through, and we remain in our current rental location at Penobscot Christian School. Many of our college students graduated and moved on, along with the loss of several key volunteers, leaving a void in our ministries. However, the most challenging chapter in the life of the church was the dismissal of our pastor. Those details will be shared with any pastor pursuing a possible call to New Hope Church.

In 2022, as Jonathan Fischer left our pastorate, New Hope began a journey into our next phase of ministry. We were blessed by many local pastors who provided pulpit supply faithfully week after week. Eventually we hired a specialized transitional minister, Roger Sparks, through the CRCNA. He served New Hope for a year and encouraged us in a season of healing and reflection, paving the way to begin our pastor search process. Since Pastor Sparks' departure, another recently retired local pastor, Bill Johnson, has filled our pulpit while we continue our pastor search.

Throughout this season, the church leadership team watched the theological drift of the CRCNA, investigated available pastoral candidates and prayed about where New Hope should be aligned in the future. Many of New Hope's members and leaders have a presbyterian background, so in the spring of 2024, the elders began discussing aligning with the PCA. After more prayer, research, counsel, and discussion with local PCA leaders, the Council voted to pursue the denominational transfer.

Over the summer of '24 the Council shared this new vision with the New Hope congregation who eagerly embraced this new direction.

WORSHIP SERVICES

ON A TYPICAL SUNDAY

Worship at NHC is fairly traditional in the elements of the service. The weekly liturgy contains many historical elements, worship songs, hymns, prayer of confession and assurance of pardon, congregational prayer, the Lord's Prayer, responsive reading, giving of offering, scripture readings, preaching, twice-monthly Communion, and benediction. Our musical flavor is a blended contemporary style which is typically guitar led. When possible, we add keyboard, drums, bass, and sometimes violin and multiple vocalists. Most weeks we sing four songs which range from traditional and re-instrumented hymns to contemporary praise songs. Our intention is to have content-driven worship, with the songs linked to themes in the Scripture reading or sermon, or to elements of the service (Communion, baptism, confession, etc.).

On the first and third Sunday of each month we celebrate the Lord's Supper together.

Following the service on the third Sunday of the month, we have a fellowship potluck.











NEW HOPE DEMOGRAPHICS

"The time may soon arrive when the three great cities of North America — Bangor, New York, and San Francisco — shall be representatives of the wealth, population, intelligence, and enterprise of the eastern, central and western divisions of our country." — Oliver Frost (1869)



It may sound fantastical to compare Bangor, Maine, (population 31,753) to New York and San Francisco, but there was a time, not too long ago, that the "Queen City" was the burgeoning capital of the American lumber industry. A lot has happened in Bangor since the mid-19th century, including devastating fires in 1856, 1869, 1872, and especially 1911, which gutted the downtown area. The lumber-focused economy, memorialized by a 30' tall statue of mythical lumberjack Paul Bunyan near the Downtown area, gave way to a modern economy based on manufacturing, services, healthcare, and education.

Bangor functions as the service, shopping, and entertainment center for most of Northern Maine. Thus, the greater Bangor area is home to two universities (including the state flagship University of Maine campus, nine miles from Bangor) several smaller colleges and trade schools, two hospitals, and numerous government and professional offices. Bangor is also home to the Air National Guard, 101st Air Refueling Wing, and the only military commissary in the state. Bangor's extensive dining and retail options far exceed what its population would imply.

Arts & Entertainment

Bangor also offers cultural and entertainment opportunities far beyond that of most cities three times its size. The Waterfront Concerts series at the Maine Savings Amphitheater hosts a diverse lineup of national and international musicians in a modern, luxurious, outdoor venue each year from late spring through early fall.

Food / Dining Out



The Bangor area has a vibrant restaurant scene. <u>DowntownBangor.com</u> highlights the many varied options the city can provide: "From upscale dining to casual eats and food trucks along the waterfront, your taste buds can travel the world in our 40+ independent and locally owned pubs, restaurants and nightlife venues, all within walking distance of each other. If you're looking for an authentic dining experience, whether it's for locally-crafted beer and snacks on a patio, a quick sandwich during a lunch break, innovative fare for a special evening, a night out on the town, or just a place to linger over a coffee, downtown Bangor has it all."

Additionally, in suburban Bangor, we have a variety of popular national chains including Chipotle and Chick-fil-A. (One of only a handful in all New England!)

Transportation

Bangor has a metropolitan bus system with routes extending into the surrounding communities of Brewer, Old Town, and Orono. Local taxis, along with Uber and Lyft, are also popular transportation options. Bangor International Airport is a convenient gateway airport, with direct flights available to Boston, New York, Washington, D.C., several cities in Florida, and other destinations. Alternatively, Bangor is only 2 hours from the Portland, Maine airport offering even more destinations.



Education

In addition to robust public-school systems in Bangor and the surrounding communities, Bangor is home to John Bapst Memorial High School, which was recently ranked in the top 20% of private high schools nationally by *The Washington Post*. The area is home to three Christian schools, one of which, Penobscot Christian School, is New Hope Church's current host.

Outdoor Recreation

Our region is a paradise for those who enjoy spending time outdoors. Even within the city limits of Bangor you



will find opportunities to connect with the outdoor world, such as the 680-acre Bangor City Forest. Acadia National Park is located approximately one hour away. Baxter State Park, location of Mount Katahdin (the northern terminus of the Appalachian Trail), is approximately 1 ½ hour drive from Bangor. Closer by, there are dozens of smaller parks and recreational areas that offer hiking, biking, swimming, cross-country skiing and snowshoeing. Countless lakes, ponds, rivers, and streams offer beautiful places to explore by canoe, kayak, sail, or power

boat. Access to the Interstate Trail System for snowmobiles and all-terrain vehicles is within easy reach for those who prefer mechanized outdoor adventures. Western Maine is home to some of the best alpine skiing

in New England at Sugarloaf and Sunday River ski resorts, along with a dozen smaller facilities.

Maine Climate

"He changes times and seasons; he removes kings and sets up kings; he gives wisdom to the wise and knowledge to those who have understanding;" – Daniel 2:21

The Lord uses the variability of the seasons throughout the year as a frequent metaphor in Scripture, often coupled with reminders of His absolute authority over them. Indeed, Creation is constantly in a state of change; not chaotic change, but purposeful movement during which there is "a time for every matter under Heaven."

The changing seasons in Maine provide us with ample fodder for contemplation of God's providence in Creation, and offer distinct times for a gloriously wide range of activities. Conditions range from warm summers to winters when temperatures are reliably below freezing and plentiful snow accumulates. Each of the four distinct seasons supplies unique opportunities and has its own special purpose.



Summer



The flagship season for Maine's robust tourism industry, summer in Maine can be hot but is more frequently pleasantly warm (average daytime highs 75-80°F). Even cooler along the coast, this comparative mildness draws large crowds from areas to the south, eager for relief from sweltering heat and humidity. Summer is the perfect time for hiking, camping, biking, boating, fishing, or a swim in one of Maine's hundreds of lakes, ponds, and rivers. Summer, along with the peak of the tourism season, is generally considered to run from Memorial Day to Labor Day, although warm daytime temperatures generally linger into late September.

Fun Fact: Due to Bangor's position near the 45th parallel, we have over 15 hours per day of daylight for much of the summer!

Fall

The arrival of Fall in September brings shortening days and cooler temperatures, though this often comes as a relief to Mainers who by now have had enough of the heat and humidity of Summer. Indeed, the lower temperatures make Fall the best time for more athletic outdoor pursuits, like hiking or mountain biking. Spectacular fall foliage sweeps from North to South across the state over the month of October, painting the forests brilliant shades of yellow, orange, and red, and drawing another influx of tourists. Late fall, beginning in November, is closely associated by



native Mainers with hunting season, as Northern Maine has strong hunting, fishing, and trapping traditions.

Winter



Winter, running from December through March and bringing daytime high temperatures that only occasionally rise above freezing, can be intimidating to some. But like the other seasons, it brings unique opportunities and provides a necessary and valuable part of the seasonal cycle. Many Mainers value the generous snowfall, particularly at higher elevations, for the recreational opportunities it brings: snowmobiling, cross-country and alpine skiing, and snowshoeing are popular winter-only activities. Children treasure the free construction material for snowmen and snow forts. Skating, both at indoor and

outdoor venues, is popular with all ages. For many, winter provides a season of rest. Evenings spent reading in a comfortable chair by a warm fire provide a necessary counterbalance to the hectic days of summertime when, despite the length of days, it never seems like there's *quite* enough time.

Spring

Springtime is a time of rapid change in Maine. Noticeably warmer daytime temperatures usually begin in late March, building through April until the joyous arrival of the first "T-shirt weather" day sometime between late-April and mid-May (depending on personal cold tolerance). Melting snow combines with frequent rain showers to bring on "Mud Season", a joyful time for children and a minor annoyance for adults, but the beauty of the blooming wildflowers and return of visible life to the plants and trees puts everybody in a celebratory mood.



Spiritual Climate



As beautiful and historic as Bangor and Maine are, we, as a state, are in the midst of a faith crisis. Maine battles Vermont each year for the title of "Least Churched State in the USA". It is not a title we wish to keep! Maine trends politically liberal, independent, and extremely self-reliant. Many people in Maine would best be described as "Post-Church." There is a fairly strong Catholic community as well as a Unitarian, Congregational, and Methodist presence. There are also some non-denominational churches, with Baptist leanings. Churches with a reformed foundation are a rarity in the area. There is an

OPC church in our community and a few other churches with some reformed tendencies, and we have seen some resurgence in the past several years of an interest in reformed theology.
